
PARISH UPDATE



WINTER PREPARATIONS

During a particular cold spell last winter, residents commented upon the lack of provision of a road grit bin in Martin. As the standard size yellow salt bin occupied too big a footprint for any available space in Martin, Langdon Parish Council has purchased a yellow wheelie bin to provide road grit for public use. The bin will be stowed near the bus stop opposite The Lantern Inn during the winter months.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

New District Local Plan: The parish council has responded to the recent consultation by DDC to review the Settlement Boundaries of the parish's village and hamlets. The responses will feed into the next stage of the new District Local Plan which should be published for further public comment at the end of the year.

Street Lighting: Most of Langdon's faulty street lights have been upgraded to LED units.

Traffic Calming: At the request of the parish council, KCC Highways installed two Automatic Traffic Counters to capture vehicle movements over a 7 day period in Martin Mill and East Langdon. The data will inform the council's traffic monitoring programme for the parish.

Broadband Services: Following the publication of the Government's **Project Gigabit Delivery Plan**, KCC has set out a strategy for its **Kent Broadband Programme** which aims to support better broadband, particularly in rural areas of the county. More information can be found at **www.kent.gov.uk/broadband**.

Parish Council Grants: A modest allocation of funding is made available to parish organisations each year to help support community activities. Notices will be published on the parish noticeboard before the end of the year. Contact a parish councillor for more details.

East Langdon Village Pond: This is a regular agenda item at council meetings. See the article on page 4 of this newsletter for the background details.

Parish Phone Box Libraries: Our thanks go to Joan Miller (West Langdon) and Olive O'Dell (East Langdon) who have kept the libraries well-stocked with donated books. The Covid-19 lock-down prevented the libraries from opening until August when restrictions were lifted and visitors could browse through the books again.

Langdon Playing Field: We are pleased to announce that the field charity has been awarded £710 by the DDC Community Grants Scheme towards upgrade works. The LPFA charity has renewed its Gift Aid Tax Relief status so that gifted or cash donations will attract an additional tax relief rebate from HMRC. This will help the on-going maintenance works programme to be delivered.



Wild Flower Areas: Several residents have expressed an interest in allowing wild plant areas to develop. A section of West Langdon green has been left mostly uncut for several years, as have the playing field embankments. A small area at St Augustine's churchyard will be sown with wild flower mix to encourage insects and wild life.

Appreciating our Rural Landscape:

Taking the time to enjoy our countryside is beneficial in many ways for our health and well-being. Local Martin resident Andrew Searle was invited to share his thoughts:-

Follow your chosen path!

Kent is blessed with an amazing number of varied and interesting footpaths, many of which are easily accessible from our parish.

Within 2 or 3 miles we have access to the long-distance North Downs Way and of course the glorious White Cliffs Country Trail but we also have attractive smaller paths going out from our villages to Pineham, Guston, Sutton, Ringwould and beyond.

Paths, tracks and ways are generally known as Public Rights of Way (PROW) and you can find them marked on the local Ordnance Survey (OS) maps or on the KCC website https://webapps.kent.gov.uk/countrysideaccesscams/standardmap.aspx. This interactive map is most useful as, in addition to showing the rights of way, there is a reporting tool allowing one to record faults that may be found along a particular way. These could be anything from a fallen tree across the path to a stile needing repair.

You will see from the marked routes on an OS Map, or from the colours on the online PROW map, that there are several designations of Rights of Way. Briefly these are footpaths, bridleways (can also be used by cyclists and horse-riders), byways open to all traffic and restricted byways (mechanically driven vehicles not allowed).

It is useful to know your rights and responsibilities when using PROWs, also those of the landowners and the highway authority (in our case that's KCC). A good summary is provided by The Ramblers Association https://www.ramblers.org.uk/advice/paths-in-england-and-wales/rights-of-way-law.aspx

If you are interested in getting out on local walks with other people, guided by knowledgeable walk leaders, then the White Cliffs Ramblers (WCR) group is well worth joining. http://www.whitecliffsramblers.org.uk/index.php. They offer walks with a range of distances and covering East Kent.

As well as guided walks, WCR volunteers help walkers (and KCC!) with some footpath maintenance tasks such as clearing overgrown paths. I am involved in these tasks and would be happy to provide further information to anyone interested.

Walking is good for your health, alone or in company and keeps our footpaths open. I commend it to you!

CHRISTMAS IN THE LANGDONS

Regular services have taken place in the churches at East and West Langdon since we came out of lockdown back in July 2020. Whilst our usual social and fund-raising events have had to be cancelled during 2020 and 2021, we are planning ahead for 2022 in the hope that we can return to some shared enjoyment.

Our fund-raising activities are to raise funds for major repairs and improvements and in the last 20 years the internal area, except for the bell tower, has been redecorated, the Victorian stained-glass windows have been cleaned and repaired, a composting toilet and storeroom have been added and the churchyard has had a makeover to create the beautiful and serene place that it now is. Our current plans include internal works and decoration of the bell tower, cleaning and repainting the four bells and their infrastructure and establishing a wildflower area in the south-west sector of the churchyard.

The ten allotments in the "Clerk's Garden" adjoining Jossenbloc at the western end of East Langdon are managed by the church. Despite the challenges caused by a very grassy season, the gardeners have produced a varied and colourful selection of vegetables, fruit and flowers. It has been rewarding to see the success of these allotments which were re-established in 2015.

St Augustine's Church has been on this site for 10 centuries and it is for the benefit and use of all in the Langdons and that is why it is looked after. If, by chance, over the next 5 years we have a need to seek financial help to do what is necessary to preserve and enhance this church facility, we hope that you will be able to support such fund-raising activities. It is your church.

Church Farm Mews Pond at East Langdon

Local residents have expressed concern about the demise of the pond and how it might be restored. Bernard Griffiths, chairman of the Mews residents group, explains: "As all are aware, the pond has drastically changed over the recent past years and has now transformed into more of a 'wetland' area as opposed to an ornamental pond. There are multiple reasons for this, there appears to be damage to the liner to the pond, there has been a very large influx of silt material from the gulley in Church Lane and this silt appears to have included possible fertilisers from the neighbouring fields further up in Waldershare Lane, although this is unconfirmed. The end result has

been that the pond area now ebbs and flows with rainfall and has had a major proliferation of plant growth.

The area is owned by the Church Farm Mews Management Company, in essence the residents of Church Farm Mews. Over the past 18 months efforts have been made to address the issue, initially with a view to returning the area to a full pond again. This has involved multiple contacts with KCC and Highways, resulting in the exploratory undertaken last year, after which they stated that they would be taking no further action as it was not their responsibility. Under the Highways Act there is right to discharge surface water from the road into inland or tidal waters. Independent pond contractors have also been consulted on the restoration of the pond. This resulted in an assessment that the cost to remove the current silt and plant life, removal of the damaged liner, replacement with a new liner and making good would cost in the region of £100k."

Langdon Parish Council has been involved in exploring ways of re-instating the pond as it is considered to be a significant wildlife amenity and community asset within the conservation area of East Langdon. (editor).
